

MORE NEWS ON THE FILM, 'DIVIDED LOYALTIES'

Work proceeds apace at Toronto International Studios in Kleinburg with the interior of Johnson Hall being erected inside one of the studios, a massive fort representing Niagara, Stanwix and Oswego being built out back as well as a six longhouse Oneida Village. The fort's appearance is cleverly altered when its identity changes. Two 6 pdrs on field carriages and two 3's on garrison mounts are well underway in plywood & vinyl and at 20' Glen Smith will be envious.

All troops will need 40 rolled cartridges per Shooting Day. Our NCO's will record your consumption each day and you will be remunerated at \$0.40 per round. Please don't think of cheating; my reputation's worth more than that. This charge is about double cost, so you get payment for your manufacturing.

Get some more powder from LCpl Ron Maybee at Black Creek if you're short. Don't roll with newspapers; it's too obvious on the close-ups.

We're looking for 4 Security persons on each shooting day to guard our kit when we're wearing other clothing or carrying props as the film unit has no method of securing gear. I'm suggesting 4 bodies so that there's relief, allowing 2 to view the film making while the other 2 guard. Volunteers please advise me. Campfollowers welcome for this. NB: you will be guarding the kit of other reenactors as well. I don't suggest kids at this as the days are long.

We need 8 Campfollowers to appear in the film for July 29- the March into Oswego. These are not to be prim & proper; but, should look like women who have endured a trip of 300 miles up the St. Lawrence and across the Lake. That is, your kit needs to show dirt and wear. Some children welcome on this one, in the same state of disrepair.

Regulations for Building Ye Ships of War

1. Ships must be made of cardboard and a method of controlling the vessel would be to mount straps fore and aft, running over the shoulders of the crew members. Other methods might work and will be acceptable .
2. Teams must supply their own ships; their own water bombs made from balloons or Baggies and their own water PISTOLS. Note Well: This is an 18th C game, so there will be no semi-automatic, automatic, electronic, etc. weaponry.
3. There must be a minimum of two people per crew. There is no maximum. 64 gun Ships of the Line are welcome as are Sloops and Frigates.
4. Every member of a crew must wear a Bicorn or a Slouch Hat.
5. Each ship must be emblazoned with a Name and mount a British Jack (ie. Flag, you ninnies) Names such as, HMS Triumph; HMS Xerxes; HMPS NigNog; HMCS Fortier. Of course, USS names would be considered in bad taste.
6. Each team can devise their own way of carrying their water balloons.
7. Colours denoting which team you are on will be supplied as will extra Colours to be mounted on any prizes that you might board and capture. Please provide a 4 inch, horizontal cut on your ship's bow so that these

- colours can be securely mounted.
8. All Royal Yorkers of any age and sex are encouraged to participate. Teams may be fielded by any group of enthusiasts or by Sections.
 9. For those not inclined to take to the 'waters', FIXED shore batteries of heavy guns may be mounted to catch any unwary mateloes who run aground on a shoal or who tack onto a lee shore.

Ye Sail Past

Before the Naval Action commences there will be an official Sail Past at which time the most ship shape vessel will be judged by Rear Admiral Gerrard MacMartin VD w/Scar and Captain Raymond Tackaberry UE, both eminently qualified for this task, both having served under Rodney on the West Indies Station in 1781.

Ye Selection of Fleets (Teams you ninnies)

Fleets will be picked through a unique and totally neutral method which is none of your business.

Ye Object of Said Naval Summer Manoeuvres

To sink or capture the enemy's Flagship.

Rules for the Conduct of Ye Naval Summer Manoeuvres

1. Ships must tack at all times. Tacks can be anything from six to ten steps.
 2. Unless you are foundering or boarding a prize, your ship must be in motion at all times.
 3. If your hat is knocked off or you are hit by a water balloon that does not burst, you are wounded and cannot throw balloons; but, you can use your water pistol for harassment. (like Royal Marines in the tops)
 4. Once you are dead, you must return to the home harbour. That is, you get out of the ship and swim ashore, not messing around on the way. If your ship can manage to come back and pick you up, you are alive again.
 5. If there is only one person alive in a ship, it is considered foundering and must stay still until it is boarded by another ship. Any ship can be captured and boarded by the enemy, in which case survivors from the crew are considered pressed men and will do service under the enemy's flag. At least one boarder from the victorious ship must crew the prize. Ships may be scuttled by the victor if insufficient ammunition, excessive damage or some other factor warrants. (ship is turned on its side) Extra crew to join other ships of their Fleet.
 6. If everyone in your ship dies, she must be abandoned and left afloat for either Fleet to reoccupy or board for supplies.
 7. If your Fleet's Flagship comes into harms way, the Flag may transfer to any other ship of the Fleet.
 8. The Fleet which captures or sinks the other's Flagship has won the Battle.
- 3) NEWS FROM THE UEL ANNUAL CONVENTION, LENNOXVILLE, QUEBEC
